The 2023 Yale World Scholar's Cup Finale from November 2-9 at New Haven, Connecticut was truly a Tournament of Champions with 2700 scholars from countless countries participating after qualifying from the various WSC Global rounds. On discussion were thought-provoking topics like: "All the documents in the Library of Alexandria are traded with the Library of Congress across time and space. Which society do you think will be most impacted?", "That movies set in the future should be regularly updated with improved special effects", "That history lessons should omit the names of the people involved in specific historical events", "That multiple AI replicas of beloved historical figures should be released into the general population", "That Scholars should be allowed to use ChatGPT in Team Debate."

Doing justice to these topics the four junior and five senior teams of Hill Spring students made their presence felt in this assembly of super-achievers.









Team Vivaan Verma, Kabir Gupta and Aarushi Shah were placed 10th in the Team Championship rank, and 4th in the Scholar's Challenge.

Team Nysha Nahar, Arhaan Shah, Raha Krishna Mehta were placed 24th in the Team Championship rank, 21st in the Scholar's Challenge, and 19th in the Scholar's Bowl.

Team Arham Doshi, Araiya Zaveri, Anaya Bhartia were placed 28th in the Team Championship rank.

Team Aanshi Chokshi, Ananya Sampath and Rida Khan were placed 26th in the Senior Team Championship rank, 2nd in South Asia, 17th in the Scholar's Challenge, and 28th in the Team Debate.

Vivaan Verma was the World Literature & Media Scholar in the Scholar's Challenge where he also won five gold medals and was ranked 2nd while **Kabir Gupta** was ranked 20.

On a proud note, **Ananya Sampath** was distinguished with the honour of carrying the Indian flag in the closing ceremony.





Celebrating 20 Years of Innovation: Hill Spring International School's Sci-Tech Exhibition 2023

On 21st December 2023, Hill Spring International School organised a splendid science and technology exhibition. It was a culmination of six months of dedication and creativity from students across Early Years, Primary Years Programme, IGCSE, and the Diploma Programme. This event, inaugurated by Dr. Pratibha Mirashi, not only showcased the brilliant minds of our students but also marked a significant milestone in the school's history – 20 years of excellence in education, particularly science and technology education.

It was an opportunity for the young eager students to showcase their knowledge and interest in the various fields of science to an attentive audience of parents, scientific experts and Hill Spring alumni. The exhibition spanned the entire E Wing of the school from the turf to the IBDP Art Studio with students of diverse ages displaying their innovations and thinking prowess. The theme of the Exhibition was based on the United Nation's Sustainable Development Goal of 'Good Health and Well Being'. To ensure that students of all ages could actively participate, it was further divided into various sub themes.

Beginning with the Early Years, our youngest and brightest minds demonstrated how to take care of our physical and mental health through the sub-theme of 'Good and Healthy Habits'. They showcased the importance of good hygiene and taking care of our emotional well-being. The Primary Years students skilfully weaved their Units of Inquiry and the sub-themes of 'Food Science & Nutrition' and 'Sports, Exercise & Alternative Medicine' to bring us smart and sustainable food packaging, games and apps to help understand Ayurveda and therapeutic practices, as well as delightful sessions of Zumba and Mallakhamb to highlight the importance of physical activity in our daily lives. The IGCSE Grades 6,7, and 8 made the audience aware about various 'Diseases and Ailments'; using functional models and representations they explained the causes, effects and their treatments. Lastly, for IGCSE Grades 9 and 10 and IBDP Grade 11, the sub-theme was 'Medical Technology'. These students applied their scientific knowledge and their innovative skills to









work towards solving a particular problem in the fields of medicine and healthcare. Most of the projects highlighted a social cause and aimed to solve an ongoing and relevant issue faced by people around the world.

This exhibition was the collaboration of different ideas of different age groups and, above all, their ability to apply knowledge acquired in the classroom to real-life problems and issues.

Demonstrating their scientific and technological prowess helped students reflect on their knowledge and develop a sense of responsibility regarding the impact of their actions on themselves, others, and the world.

A meeting of mathematical minds



The fourth edition of HSMO took place on 21st October 2023 with 60 participants from various schools in Mumbai. After a lot of deliberation, the qualifying round of the Hill Spring Math Olympiad (HSMO) was conducted in person on the school premises. With the support of Grade 11 volunteers, the HSMO organizers from Grade 12 conducted the event smoothly and successfully.

The Olympiad commenced with the qualifying Multiple-Choice Question (MCQ) round, where each participant tackled a set of intricate problems individually. Pencils flew

across answer sheets, and the atmosphere brimmed with intensity. After the dust settled, four outstanding teams earned their ticket to the finals.

The finals began with a round of "Jeopardy" where the teams faced four categories of mathematical topics, each with three levels of difficulty. This round became a riveting dance

of mathematical prowess and clever strategy wherein each team displayed their risk-taking ability by selecting questions of maximum level of difficulty.

Following this, the stage was set for the "Rapid Fire" round, during which teams had six minutes to answer as many questions as they could from

a total of 10 questions. The agility of thought and speed of calculation exhibited in this round was thrilling to watch.

In the "Relay Round," participants faced a unique challenge with three questions. Once a team

member completed solving their question, only then the next team member could begin to solve their question. Teams had to strategise, ensuring each member played to their strengths, relying on their mathematical acumen while working seamlessly as a unit.

The Olympiad reached its zenith with the "Buzzer Round." Teams engaged in a high-stakes battle

of wits to outwit their opponents to secure their win. With negative scoring now in play, teams raced to hit the buzzer at electrifying speed and produce correct answers in the blink of an eye. The Buzzer Round was the crescendo of the event leaving everyone on the edge of their seats.

It was nail biting finish as a tiebreaker brought in a sudden death finale. The neck and neck scores were a testimony to the mathematical brilliance and collaborative effort of all four teams.

After a variety of rounds inspired to fuel Mathematical curiosity and intellect, the champions of the fourth edition of HSMO was the Hill Spring International School team consisting of Soumya Nigam, Mahip Jain and Parth Vora from Grade 10. The team from Aditya Birla World Academy secured the runners-up position and the teams from The Cathedral and John Connon School secured the third and fourth positions.

The Olympiad was a celebration of mathematical ingenuity, strategic thinking, teamwork, and the thrill of competition and with genuine, positive feedback from the participants, we pave the way to making HSMO grander in the years to come.



It is a highly evident and established fact that there is a MIND - BODY connection and our thoughts & emotions affect the body, therefore the emphasis on Physical, Mental and Emotional Wellbeing. Each of us face many situations in daily life that challenge our coping styles and abilities. The trouble begins when we are unable to handle a situation and it may induce "STRESS". Being in a prolonged or frequent state of stress releases certain chemicals in the body which may be detrimental for us. Our body and mind subconsciously absorb and stores stress which can manifest as chronic pains in certain body parts or affect the vital organs.

VARANASI

Nurturing Language, Culture and the Soul



Our trip to Varanasi, a city nestled on the banks of the sacred River Ganga, proved to be an eyeopening and transformative experience for our group of 11th and 12th-grade IBDP students. VOTER INFORMATION SESSION IBDP

FESTIVE CELEBRATIONS Early Years Parent Sessions

Mrs. Kachhara engaged the learners of Junior Kg by conducting an interactive session wherein she created a ten-headed Ravan with the children. She also showed them an audio-visual depicting the story of Navratri and read a book on why Dussehra is celebrated. The learners learned the importance of both festivals and how they are celebrated differently in different parts of the country.





Dhvir Dedhia's mother narrated the story of Navratri to our learners and explained the meaning of the word Navratri (Nav means nine and ratri means night). She spoke on how the festival of Navratri: is celebrated in many ways in India and various regions and that it symbolizes victory over evil. Post that they got their own set of dandiya sticks which they then decorated with stickers and used to dance to some peppy Garba songs. ed to the beats of traditional garba music.



To make our Nursery learners understand the significance of the Navratri and Dussehra festival, Aryan Mehta's mother and grandmother used recycled material to create a life-size Ravan with ten heads. They narrated the story to our learners and later just like how Lord Ram hit arrows at Ravan to show that good always wins over evil, our little learners were allowed to do the same with a toy bow and arrow. Post that they got their own set of dandiya sticks which they then decorated with stickers and used to dance to some peppy Garba songs. They ate Dhokla - a fluffy and soft savory specialty of the Gujaratis.



FESTIVE CELEBRATIONS Early Years Parent Sessions



Mrs. Jain engaged the learners of Junior Kg through a puppet show on the story of Ramayan and why Diwali is celebrated. She further made the learners make diyas and thalis to enjoy the festive fervor.



Mrs. and Mr. Gupta, Manit Gupta's parents conducted an Art session to celebrate the festival of Diwali. They began by showing the students a video on why and how we celebrate Diwali. Each child was given an opportunity to paint their own clay diyas. The learners concluded the session by decorating their homeroom to welcome goddess Laxmi.



Nitya Harian's mother brought Diwali festivities to Nursey by introducing our little learners to the background story behind the celebrations. She shared more information about the reasons why Goddess Laxmi and lord Ganesha are worshipped on the auspicious day of Diwali. Learners then got a chance to paint their own diyas and give festive shimmer. They also shared Kaju katlis, after all what are Indian festivals without Indian sweets.



PARENT INTERACTIONS Early Years



Play is an essential aspect of a child's development, encompassing a wide range of activities and experiences. It enhances their social and cognitive skills. Mrs. Marfatia's (Kabir's mother) involvement and enthusiasm made a significant difference in the children's learning experience. The joy and excitement on their faces during the play session were truly priceless. The lemon on the spoon race and throwing the balls kept them totally engaged.

Mrs. and Mr. Hirani, Aarvee's parents, engaged the learners in games involving fun and learning. The Feeding the Clown game tested the learner's skills with numbers. They had to roll the dice, count the dots, and pick up that many balls from the tray to feed the clowns. For the Ring, the Cones game the learners picked a chit, identified the middle sound (a and I), and put a ring around the corresponding CVC word.





Mrs. Jain, Hitarth's mother, conducted a science session connected to the ongoing UOI-Senses. The children had the opportunity to plant seeds of their choice. She explained that just like we get minerals and vitamins from fruits and vegetables, plants get them from fertilizers. She informed them that all the 'medicines' for the plants were organic and had no chemicals in them.



Mrs. Bakshi (Naina Bakshi's mother) shared a presentation about Mahatma Gandhi for Gandhi Jayanti. She spoke about how he was kind and generous and fought to give freedom to India. This was followed up by reading a story "Have you filled my bucket today?". Learners gave anecdotes stating how they could be kind to people and fill their buckets full of happiness.

PARENT SESSIONS Early Years

FUN WITH SCIENCE Early Years



Students of Grade 5 engaged the learners of Junior Kg in a fun and engaging science session connected to the ongoing unit of inquiry 'Shadows'. They explained the use of scientific principles that govern our daily life in simple terms. They were intrigued to see the walking water experiment which got them thinking as to how water can pass from one glass to another without lifting it up.



Dr. Vibha Murarka, a dermatologist conducted an interactive session with the learners of Junior Kg. In connection with the science fair, she familiarized the learners with the advantages and disadvantages of sunlight and artificial light. She further explained to them things that can be used to protect themselves from sunlight.





Mr. Jatin Rathod, an astronomer by profession conducted an interactive session with the learners of Junior Kg. He explained them the scientific principle on the occurrence of day and night. He further engaged them by stating the facts of the solar system.



Students of Junior Kg visited the Physics laboratory for a fun and engaging science session connected to the ongoing unit of inquiry 'Shadows'. The handson experience deepened their understanding of the relationship between the source of light and the shadow. The coloured shadow made learning a rich and memorable experience for the learners.
